Must Love Books

When the main character's daddy gets a new job, he is too tired to read bedtime stories, so it's time to get a new adult to read at night! It is very important for children to have someone read their stories to them with enthusiasm and love! The next time you are reading with your child, ask them what they like about the way you read. Do they like you to change voices for different characters? Do they like it when you let them turn the pages? Do they like when you read books that have songs and you let them sing with you? Maybe if you can do all of the things





Mark your Place!

Purchase a box of wooden popsicle sticks and let your child make bookmarks for their friends and family! Bring out markers, stickers, paint, glue, pompoms, whatever you may have around the house, and let your child get as creative as they like making bookmarks. They can make them personal by finding coloring or painting the sticks their friend's favorite color or putting stickers of one of their family member's favorite cartoon characters. These are easy to make and will help your child learn how to mark their place in a book they are reading!





A Book Chain

Cut pieces of construction paper into long strips. Every time you and your child share a book together, write the name of the book on a strip of construction paper and let your child color the strip or try to draw a picture of a character or scene in the book. For the first book, shape the strip into a circle and glue or staple the ends together. For the next book, thread the strip through the first circle created and then glue or staple those ends together. Make a goal that when you get to 10 links, you will hang them from your child's bedroom ceiling or some other special place and start a new chain. Soon, your child will be surrounded by chains with the titles of all the books they have read!





Book Holder

Start this activity by cutting off the top flaps of a cereal box. Then, you will cut a triangle shape off the right side of the box. Start at a point 3 inches from the side and cut a slanted line until you are back at the right side of the box. Now you have a space to put in your books! Let your child use different colors or designs of duct tape to cover the box. This is a great way to keep books neatly displayed on shelves or to organize books by a theme or interest. Each time you finish a cereal box, you can make another book holder!
